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Finding a pet-friendly apartment development was a high priority for Amber Smith.

The 25-year-old Smith rents an apartment at Coventry Glen Apartments at Valley Lakes in northwest suburban Round Lake. Smith moved into a 2-bedroom apartment last summer with her significant other, Judd Kiddie, as well as Scarlett the dog and Mamou the cat.

When I was looking for an apartment, my search was limited because a lot of places don't allow pets.' said Smith, a certified nursing assistant and nursing school student.

Apartments have in-unit washer and dryer, patios or balconies, walk-in closets, gourmet kitchens, luxury baths and wall-to-wall carpeting. Each home offers a work station (a small computer nook) with six-line telephone outlets and accommodations for high-

speed Internet access. Individual garage spaces with remote controlled openers are also available.

Finding a large apartment was also important to Smith and Kiddie, One-bedroom apartments at Coventry Glen have from 710 to 782 square feet of space and 2-bedrooms have 1,100 to 1,200 square feet of space. "This is my first time liv-

ing with my boyfriend and I wanted enough space for us and the pets. Our apartment is very large," Smith

"I also like our apartment because even though we're on the second floor, we have a private entrance from the ground floor," she said. "We also have a corner unit and we have views of a forest area and the development."

Renters at Coventry Glen also enjoy amenities such

as: heated, outdoor pool; sundeck with gas grills and a fitness center (use included in the rent). Other amenities include a clubhouse, cyber cafe and business center with computers. fax machine and copier.

"The business center is wonderful and so useful," Smith said. "Being a nursing student, I have to print out syllabuses for classes. As a nursing assistant, I have to fax in timesheets, so I use the business center all the time."

Christine Kneeland, property manager for RMK, the management company, says location is one of the best features of Coventry Glen.

"We're not located in a high traffic area like Gurnee or Vernon Hills," she said "The complex is off the main road and it's quiet and beautiful here."

## Try natural approach for 'green' bathroom

The bathroom is a great place to go green. Here are some ideas:

Think organic cotton: Bath linens made from organic cotton are not only comfy and soft, but they require fewer pesticides to produce than regular cotton towels. Manufacturers that use the slightly more expensive organic cotton also tend to use natural dves.

Consider replacing your vinyl shower curtain with a heavy cotton duck curtain, says Annie B. Bond, author of Home Enlightenment and executive producer of greenliving content at Care2.com, a site devoted to natural health. "The plastic in a shower curtain is PVC, and the plasticizers in PVC are hormone disrupters," she says. "Those toxic ingredients can become airborne."

Try an all-natural approach: Natural bath products are friendlier to your skin than chemical-laden offerings from major cosmetics companies, and they won't create toxic air pollu-tion. Visit the Environmental Working Group's Skin Deep Web site, www.ewg.org/

Be water-wise: A low-flow showerhead can reduce water consumption by 30 percent, yet still provide a pressurized spray. Another nifty gadget, a gray-water diverter, sends used water from the shower or bath to a collection container for distribution to your garden. Insulating your water

heater and lowering its thermostat to 120 degrees makes a real difference in the amount of energy used to heat your morning shower. And consider replacing your toilet with a low-flow model. Use recycled building

products: Remodeling your bathroom? Seek out tile made from recycled materials for floors, baths, showers and countertops. Thanks to the popularity of recycling, colors and finishes are plentiful.

Clean green: Get rid of the harsh chemicals you use to clean tubs and toilets. Pay attention to the governmentmandated warning labels on cleaning products.

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
